

### **ANNUAL REPORT JULY 2024-JUNE 2025**

As the Connecticut Office of Early Childhood (OEC) moved to implement Early Start CT on July 1, 2025, C3's combined Leadership Work Group and School Readiness Council has been meeting to discuss and plan for the transition to Local Governance Partners (LGPs). LGPs, a vital part of OEC's vision for Connecticut's early childhood system, will serve as community hubs that strengthen trusted partnerships with families, providers, and local stakeholders while empowering families to shape strategies that address the holistic needs of children from birth to age five. The first six months will focus on refining our current C3 structure to meet the four core components: a Fiduciary (Town of Colchester) to oversee contracts and budgets; a Liaison (C3's Early Childhood Coordinator) to coordinate services and support quality; a Parent Ambassador to amplify family voices and connect caregivers to resources; and a Community Table of stakeholders (C3's Leadership Work Group) dedicated to advancing early childhood outcomes. Through this model, C3 will continue to engage families by building networks and promoting

participation, providers through quality assurance and professional development, and the broader community by convening partners and implementing collaborative solutions. As an LGP, C3 will receive a stable funding stream for 2025-2027 and get support from Shine Early Learning, the LGP Intermediary with the OEC. Building on our success as a School Readiness Council and Local Early Childhood Collaborative, C3 will use these foundations to move into our new role as a LGP under Early Start CT.

#### **POWER OF PARTNERSHIPS - FAMILY PLACE LIBRARIES™**

The Cragin Memorial Library received the FamilyPlace Libraries™ designation on Tuesday morning, November 19, 2024, when representatives certified the library as a site and awarded the official Family Place banner. Family Place Libraries™ is a national initiative that transforms libraries into welcoming community hubs focused on early literacy, parent education, and family support, with a network of over 500 sites in 32 states. The program is founded on the understanding that good health, early learning, parental involvement, and supportive communities are essential to a young child's development. Cragin has strengthened its familyfriendly environments through staff training, enhanced collections, specially designed spaces, collaboration with community resource providers,



and hosting Parent Child Workshops. This milestone marks the culmination of years of dedication and investment by C3, the Cragin Memorial Library Board of Trustees, and the Friends of Cragin Memorial Library.

# PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

C3 hosted a workshop for early care and education providers from across the community, *Creating a Compassionate School Culture*, by Bradley Hospital's Department of Behavioral Education and Training. Participants appreciated the many concrete strategies and materials provided to the group. Additionally, Joy Lenares provided a Circle of Security Classroom refresher to a cohort of Colchester Elementary School teachers at their request.

#### **NEW PROGRAMS**

C3 added a few new offerings this year including a Book Club for Parents, a Healthy Tech Habits series, and Conscious Discipline classes for Dads! We received positive feedback for all of them and will continue to offer in the coming year.

Our Parent Council met regularly this year to assist us in engaging with families and our community. - Children facing barriers, risks, setbacks, or challenges to their healthy development are sought out and offered quality services.
- Families receive services and supports in an efficient, equitable, coordinated, caring, professional, and effective manner.

#### **PROGRAM DATA**

- Provided 24 subsidized school-day preschool spaces and 21 part-day spaces through School Readiness.
- **188** Families participated in Play & Learn groups and Stroller Walks across **3** seasons.
- 46 Parent Education opportunities of varying lengths.
- Provided 206 sessions of programming for children.
- **60** Parents/Caregivers participated in at least one of our Parent Education programs.
- Hosted 11 evening or weekend family programs and participated in 5 community awareness events.
